Matthews has been with SRWP for more than two years, previously serving as SRWP's grant writer.

Prior to SRWP, Matthews worked with regional organizations and school districts to design programs and obtain funding for environmental education and projects, leadership

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training and program expansion. She holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in biology from California State University, Sacramento.
